New Community Litter Picking Guidelines

During the last 18 months, the number of residents, community groups, and businesses carrying out litter picks across the borough has grown considerably.

There are many different reasons for volunteering to pick up litter. For some people it's because they hate the sight of litter spoiling where they live, and for others it's the enjoyment they get from doing some physical exercise and getting some fresh air while doing something valuable at the same time. We've also met people who do it because they want their fellow residents to see that dropping litter is not a good idea. Whatever the reason, the Love Solihull Team appreciates the time each person gives and the positive results, and it's important to us that everyone feels valued and supported.

Love Solihull continues to expand and so, acting on some recent feedback, we decided it would be a good time to get together with a few representatives from some of the community groups to discuss their experiences and to see what additional support they need.

The priority was to review all the community litter-picking guidelines and risk assessments. As a result of this, a number of changes were made which the council's Health and Safety team has approved. The new litter picking guidelines have now been shared with all the volunteers, making their involvement safer and more enjoyable.

Damson Lane Park makes 16 Green Flags for Solihull!

Damson Lane Park has been awarded a Green Flag – bringing the total number of Green Flags for Solihull's parks and green spaces to 16. The Green Flag Award scheme is managed by Keep Britain Tidy and sets the benchmark standard for the management of recreational outdoor spaces across the United Kingdom and

around the world.

Solihull Council's Cabinet Member for the Environment and Highways, Cllr Ken Hawkins, said: "Solihull's motto is Urbs in Rure - the town in the countryside - and our latest Green Flag reinforces our commitment to the environment and green spaces.

"Damson Lane Park's success is largely down to the hard work of the Friends of Damson Park. The group has raised funds for park improvements - including a new footpath around the park, outdoor gym equipment and play facilities - and they also organise an annual dog show.

"This year we have successfully held on to our existing 15 Green Flags and can now welcome Damson Lane Park to our Green Flag family. I'm tremendously proud of all the staff and voluntary groups who have worked so hard to make this possible."

The purpose and aims of the Green Flag Award scheme are:

- To ensure that everybody has access to quality green and other open spaces, irrespective of where they live.
- To ensure that these spaces are appropriately managed and meet the needs of the communities that they serve.
- To establish standards of good management and to promote.
- To share good practice amongst the green space sector.
- To recognise and reward the hard work of managers, staff and volunteers.

Winning Carpet Bed Design

Tamzin Clarke, a pupil from Smith's Wood Academy, has had her design planted up in flowers after winning the annual Love Solihull flowerbed design competition.

The competition was in partnership with the Royal British Legion and their 'Thank You' campaign, which last year marked 100 years since the end of World War One.



The competition received more than 300 entries from 12 local schools but it was Tamzin Clarke, age 12, who drew the winning entry. Her design has now been transformed into a flowerbed within Malvern Park and showcases the importance of the Poppy as a symbol of hope and remembrance.

Elaine Butler, Legion County President for Warwickshire & Birmingham said: "The Legion is here to champion Remembrance but also to allow it to evolve. We want to empower people to find new ways to remember those who have served, to give all communities the freedom to develop their own forms of Remembrance which reflect their own histories and cultures. Therefore, the Love Solihull flowerbed is a perfect example of how we remember all that served the sacrifices that were made and it symbolises hope for the future."

Love Solihull contacted schools with details about the competition and gave the schools factsheets about the Thank You 100 campaign.
